Here at The Arc Arapahoe & Douglas Counties we are so grateful to people with disabilities and their families that we work with every day. Since we serve everyone from birth through end of life, and we don't care what your label is, we get to meet lots of people with a huge variety of strengths, interests and needs. You certainly keep us reaching for excellence in obtaining accurate information and understanding different systems of care!

In 2019, we continued to collaborate with our sister chapters of The Arc across the state to support, amend, oppose and monitor legislation at the state and federal level. Your chapter also spends a great deal of time working with the departments of state who implement and distribute funding that the legislature enacts. This year, Lee and Carol spent a lot of time working on a stakeholder committee at Medicaid that is working to implement a new assessment tool for long-term care services (waivers like CES, SLS, HCBS-DD etc.). This tool will automatically feed assessment information into a personcentered planning tool. It is complicated and difficult work, but we want to make sure that the final product meets the needs of the people we support and serve. Carol was appointed to the Children's Subcommittee of the Governor's Behavioral Health Task Force and continued to work with the Douglas County Mental Health Initiative. Through our advocacy work with individuals, we know that access to behavioral health services is difficult to find and navigate for people with a co-occurring intellectual and developmental disability. We also worked on the IDD Waiver redesign committee, where Carol serves as a stakeholder co-chair. We know that our folks depend upon these waivers and we want to do everything in our power to get it right. The significant amount of time we spend in committee meetings is valuable because you help us understand what is working and what is not working in these systems of care. One senior staff member at Health Care Policy and Financing (Medicaid) said that she believes The Arcs are like canaries in the coal mine. We often see what needs fixing before the larger systems of care even knows that there is a problem.

We are having much more fun at The Arc and in our community. Since we get most of our funding from the arcThrift stores, we don't have to answer to foundations and other grant makers. The only people we answer to is you! So, when you told us that social activities are important to you, we made that happen. There is a lot of science to back up this use of resources. Social isolation is a big problem for people with IDD and their families. We want you to know that we take "belonging" seriously. You are welcome here.


The Arc Arapahoe & Douglas Counties is affiliated with The Arc of Colorado and The Arc of the United States.

STAFF

The Arc Arapahoe & Douglas Counties has ten staff members who focus on children's advocacy, adult advocacy, systems advocacy, education, community outreach, fun events, communications and operations. Due to the small number of staff, many volunteers support our mission through office work, building and grounds beautification, and social activities.

GEOGRAPHIC AREA

The Arc Arapahoe & Douglas Counties serves people with disabilities and their family members in Arapahoe and Douglas counties, excluding the City of Aurora (which is served by The Arc of Aurora). Best estimates based on incidence ratios indicate there are 15,180 (2.3% with an IQ of 70 or under) children and adults with intellectual/developmental disabilities (I/DD) living in Arapahoe County (excluding the City of Aurora) and Douglas counties.





Systems Advocacy

Here is a partial list of activities we participated in during 2019:

- CANDO Colorado Collaborative for Autism and Neuro-Developmental
 Disabilities Opportunities This group is working to implement the strategic plan
 from the Colorado Autism Commission.
- Children's Habilitative Residential Program (CHRP) Waiver We are monitoring the implementation of this important program that should allow children with IDD and their families access to appropriate care.
- Children's Disability Advisory Committee (Medicaid & Kids) This collaborative works to solve systemic problems for children that access Medicaid and other services.
- Crisis Intervention and Prevention Project In collaboration with JFK Partners,
 The Arc of Colorado, and many other organizations, we monitored the
 implementation of the pilot project to ensure that Colorado receives accurate
 information regarding the significant gaps in treatment for people with I/DD and
 co-occurring mental health conditions.
- The Family Support Council at Developmental Pathways Staff attend these meetings to cultivate the development of family support in our community.
- **Disability Policy Collaborative, Washington D.C.** This conference provides the opportunity to influence federal legislation as well as collaborate and learn from disability organizations nationwide.
- Douglas County Mental Health Initiative Staff served on this committee focused on ensuring that residents in Douglas county have adequate access to high quality mental health supports.
- Colorado Consumer Health Initiative We are members and involved with the public policy group that reviews health care issues for all Coloradoans.
- Transportation Interagency Councils in Arapahoe & Douglas Counties Staff participates in both groups to represent the needs of people with I/DD as they relate to public transportation.
- Protect Our Care Staff collaborates with a coalition of organizations who work to
 ensure that federal health care policy protects people with disabilities and their
 families.
- Long-term Care Assessment Tool Staff participated in the development of this
 tool that allows for person-centered assessments of strengths, needs and
 preferences.
- Waiver Re-Design Staff serves on this workgroup to develop a single Medicaid waiver for adults with I/DD.
- Governor's Behavioral Health Committee Governor appointed intensive work group to redesign mental health and behavioral health systems of care in Colorado.
- Health First Colorado (Colorado's Medicaid Program) Staff spent many hours at stakeholder meetings to ensure that the voice of individuals with I/DD was included in systems change.

The Arc Arapahoe & Douglas Counties participates in these important initiatives to ensure that the voice of children and adults with IDD and their families are heard. We focus on practical solutions to complex problems.

Individual Advocacy

The Arc Arapahoe & Douglas continues to aid in accessing services for children and adults with disabilities who may be entitled to one or more of the following: educational services, residential services, vocational services, Social Security benefits, and other local, state and federal benefits.

Our advocates assist families and individuals with disabilities to access these services through education and individual support. Advocates counsel by telephone, email, or in person. They also attend meetings with families or individuals, review documents for accuracy, and help determine appropriate services.

Children's Advocacy

As any parent knows, children do not come with instruction manuals! Parents who have children with special needs or disabilities really need instruction manuals, and those manuals need to be individualized for their child's specific strengths and needs. Here at The Arc Arapahoe & Douglas, we can help parents understand their rights and responsibilities while trying to navigate many different systems of support. We spend most of our time assisting families and older students with educational advocacy. There are federal laws and state laws and each of the six districts in our area do it a little bit differently. Our dedicated advocates know the staff in each of our districts well, and they know the laws. Advocates also know a lot about best-practices and interventions that work well for particular students. If they don't know about a certain diagnosis or learning difficulty, they network with each other and look up the characteristics on reliable websites.

We all know that children are expensive! However, children with special needs are really expensive. Our motto at The Arc, is that it is best to try to get various systems of support to pay for what is needed, because there is always something that the systems don't pay for that your child really needs. That is why we spend so much of our time and effort working to ensure that Medicaid, Medicaid waivers and commercial insurance pay for what they should be paying for! We can explain all the waivers and help families make an informed choice about programs that can help them help their child.

We often hear parents say: "why didn't somebody tell me this before?". It is probably because these systems are so complicated that it is really hard to know everything about everything, but here at The Arc, we do everything in our power to keep up to date on all the available resources.

Adult Advocacy

This year, we spent a lot of time helping individuals and families to use the new resources that the legislature made available last year. In Arapahoe and Douglas counties many of those new resources came our way because we had the biggest waiting list for residential services due to population growth over the years.

Case management turnover continues to be higher than we would like, and we are able to answer questions and provide options that newer case managers haven't learned yet.


With the passage of Employment First initiatives, we are happy to see that adults with IDD are choosing to work at least part-time. We can help them understand that you can work, and still keep important services that are needed to live in the community.

The most pressing need in our community is direct support staff that are trained and willing to support people with IDD to live their best lives. Low wages make this difficult during times of low unemployment.

This year we assisted 206 children or adults with developmental disabilities and their families who were new to our organization. Additionally, we assisted 1,613 with individual advocacy. On average, our organization works with 284 people with disabilities and/or their family members per month.

Activities

Annual Meeting

Each year our board of directors holds a meeting to elect new board members, share this report, make audited financials available, and honor our volunteers.

Mountain Trip

Fourteen adults with intellectual disabilities and friends embarked on a mountain trip near Woodland Park. We are grateful to have several volunteers who have been supporting this trip for many years.

- The Arc ADventures in Fun (Fun Fridays)
 Self-advocates (ages 15-30) with I/DD enjoyed many fun activities over the year including: "Newsies" the musical in Parker, Chatfield Corn Maze, Holiday Dinner, and Art Exhibits.
- Resource Fairs and Presentations
 We attended several resource fairs during the year and did a presentation for over 500 law enforcement officers from all over the world.
- The Sharing Tree
 King Soopers sponsored our chapter over the holidays again this year. Our community generously provided many gifts for our 12 wards and needy families during the holiday season.
- Achieve With Us Colorado Film Festival
 This event was held in March for Developmental Disability Awareness month.
 Achieve with Us is a film festival of movie shorts featuring and produced by people with I/DD.
- The Annual Picnic

This picnic in late August was special because it was the Grand Opening of "Our Place", an outdoor area for our community. We rekindled old friendships and connected with new. The National Sports Center for the Disabled set up an obstacle course for the adventurous, and South Metro Fire Rescue provided a tour of their fire truck.



Educational Programs

Building Blocks

We created this workshop to introduce families with young children to systems of care. During the program, families learn about their rights and responsibilities in the education system, Medicaid, and commercial insurance. We also explored recreation and community experiences.

- The Arc ADventures in Learning

 This adventional agriculture area.
 - This educational series was created for teenagers and young adults with I/DD and focuses on learning about relationships. The curriculum explores friendships, boyfriends/girlfriends, and community safety. We believe that this program provides a very important service to our community and look forward to continued growth in this area.
- Step Up Into Life After High School
 The Step-Up series was conducted by our chapter to assist parents and young adults with understanding resources and planning for life after high school. Forty families attended this workshop in 2019.
- Understanding the Family Caregiver Option
 Seventeen participants attended this workshop to learn about how family members can be paid to provide services in certain waivers.
- Live Well, Plan Well, Leave Well Family members attended this workshop that focuses on planning for the time when parents are no longer able to care for their children.
- The Arc ADventures in Leadership (The Two-Way Street)
 This group of self-advocates gathered once a month to give back to their community and learn leadership skills.
- Sex-Education

We have learned through our advocacy efforts, that many of our folks get in trouble because they don't have accurate information about sexual education. This class was created for teens with I/DD and is taught by Planned Parenthood. Thirteen teens attended this workshop.

Advocacy: On average, our chapter advocates for 284 individuals with I/DD and their families a month, by protecting their civil and human rights and promoting their quality of life.



735 REFERRALS TO SERVICES

Referrals: Our chapter provides information and referrals to 735 people on a yearly basis, connecting individuals and families to supports and services that may be helpful.



851 PEOPLE COUNSELED PER YEAR

Counseling: On average, our chapter counsels 851 people a year, assisting with communication and advocacy strategies that may help them access various systems of support.

Services

Guardianship

The Arc Arapahoe & Douglas Counties is guardian for 14 people in our community without family or friends who are willing or able to serve in this important role. We have many resources available that provide information to families to learn about guardianship, Power of Attorney, and Conservatorship. Our organization also provides Power of Attorney services for adults with disabilities when their guardian lives out-of-state.

Information and Resources

Every day, we receive calls in our office from individuals and families looking for resources or information. All our staff members are very knowledgeable about the existing systems that support individuals with developmental disabilities and their families. We connect families to supports and services that could be helpful. In 2019, our chapter supported 735 people with information and referral.

Education and Counseling

We also assist families with communication and advocacy strategies that can help them access various systems. Our efforts include but are not limited to extensive telephone and/or email conversations. This year we supported 851 people with education and counseling.

Communication and Networking

We recognize the importance of keeping up with trends in digital and print media and constantly strive to improve our presence and delivery. We utilize email marketing and social media to share important news, updates and valuable resources.

Grassroots Organizing

We believe that informed parents and self-advocates are great resources to our community; accordingly, we conduct educational workshops, and keep constituents informed of legislative and public policy initiatives that affect the lives of people with disabilities through our E-Alerts, Facebook and Twitter.

Collaboration

The Arc Arapahoe & Douglas Counties works with many other organizations to reduce duplication of services and to increase supports to individuals affected by disabilities. An independent auditor reviews our finances every year. Our audit report for 2019 and 990 will be available for inspection in our offices and on our website.

Two people donated through "Vehicles for Charity" and we received \$198.00 in car donations. We are also happy to report that this year we received an 8.99% increase in allocations from arc Thrift stores. We are very grateful that our funding has increased, allowing us to better serve our constituents. In 2019, 96% of our revenue came from the arc Thrift stores.
